Teachers, please note that these questions are designed only to provide a very basic literacy scaffold and to provide examples. There is plenty of room for you to add your creativity and use your expertise to develop "why" questions and to help students make connections to other texts.

The questions below should be answered using a complete sentence and with textual evidence from the reading. The questions for the Preface are answered as examples.

#### Preface

1. How deep, wide, and long is the Grand Canyon?

**Sample Answer:** The Grand Canyon is very big and "is a mile deep, ten miles wide, and 277 miles long."

2. What is one way that visitors can enjoy the Grand Canyon?

**Sample Answer:** Visitors to the Grand Canyon "can take a helicopter ride" to see the canyon if they like.

- 3. Study the illustration on page 100; what is the first thing that you would want to do if you drove up to that sign in real life and were about to enter the park? (No textual evidence is necessary for this answer.)

#### Text Analysis Questions

**Prompt**: Read the excerpt below from a website advertisement about an adventure trip on the Colorado River. Look up the definitions of words you don't understand. What are three things you would pack if you were going on an adventure trip on the Colorado River? Use one quote from the advertisement and one quote from *All About the Grand Canyon* to explain why you made the choices you did.

In the grandest canyon of the Colorado River, experience the excitement, serenity, joy and enchanting beauty of the river as it transforms the divine chasm and those who venture down it. Your Grand Canyon rafting vacation covers 188 miles in 6 or 7 days, each day descending deeper into geologic time. 
