The questions below should be answered using a complete sentence and with textual evidence from the reading. The questions for the Preface are answered as examples.

2. What is the name given to people who try to walk the whole Appalachian Trail? **Sample Answer:** People who try to walk the whole Appalachian Trail "are called thru-hikers."

Prompt: Read the excerpt below about a new app that is connected to the Appalachian Trail. How is this technology changing the way that people interact with the trail? In what other ways do you think cell phones will change how people experience the trail? Please answer both parts of the question in 1-2 paragraphs and include a quote from the excerpt in your response.

A cell phone app called Walk the Distance is now being used by over 2,000 people. This excerpt from the online version of Outside Magazine explains that:

The app connects to your iPhone's Health app, which measures the mileage you've walked while carrying your phone, even when the app isn't in use. [The] app uses that information to then show where you would be on the Appalachian Trail if you were thruhiking. And you're not hiking alone. 
